Juggling - Tell kids that I want to show them my juggling skills. In fact, I have been juggling since I was about 5. Proceed to "juggle" one ball.

No one is amazed? Why? Oh, because I made it too easy.

Writing can be challenging because you have to do two things: Think of what to say, AND think of how to say it!

This part of Essentials (IEW) is all about learning how to write something - aka "composition." This year, we are going to start off easy, because you are only juggling ONE ball - How to say it. The book will provide WHAT to say!

Good if you have a hard time making decisions, like me. (What to write; what to do for science fair; what to cook for dinners this week, what gifts to buy for holidays, etc.)

And actually, if you get a book on how to juggle, the first thing you do is learn how to juggle just ONE BALL!

- 1. First, read passage together.
- 2. Everyone needs paper to write on
- 3. Be sure to skip lines
- 4. Write Title on line "I"
- 5. Instructions: we read a sentence, choose a max of 3 words that will help us remember what it says.
- 6. Numbers, symbols, and initials are FREE
- 7. Comma between key words
- 8. Re-read sentence; what are three words that you would choose?
- 9. Repeat for each sentence.
- 10. At some point, let kids work with their mom to do one sentence

After done, set original paragraph aside and try to re"write" paragraph.

Talk About dress ups. This week, -ly adverb.

- 1. What is an adverb? Adds info about the verb.
- 2. Play the -ly game, pg 17 of Teacher's manual
- 3. Do exercise on pg 18
- 4. Remind students to add -ly to paper and vocabulary word.
- 5. Mention flashcards for vocal.
- 6. Students will get to read paper next week.
