(Chart F)</p> <p><i>subjective (nominative) pronouns, objective pronouns, possessive pronouns, possessive pronoun adjectives, reflexive pronouns</i></p>	<p>Examples, Please 100</p> <p>Name or sing the linking verbs? (Chart C)</p> <p><i>feel, become, remain, taste, seem, appear, look, sound, stay, smell, grow, am, are, is, was, were, be, being, been</i></p>

(Chart C)</p> <p><i>do, does, did, has, have, had, am, are, is, was, were, be, being, been, may, must, might, should, could, would, shall, will, can</i></p>	<p>Examples, Please 300</p> <p>Conjugate "to be." (Chart D)</p> <p><u>Infinitive</u>: to be <u>Present</u>: am, are, is <u>Past</u>: was, were <u>Present Participle</u>: being <u>Past Participle</u>: been</p>	<p>Examples, Please 400</p> <p>What are the Demonstrative Pronouns? (Chart F)</p> <p><i>this, that, these, those</i></p>	<p>Examples, Please 500</p> <p>What are the Interrogative Pronouns? (Chart F)</p> <p><i>who, whom, whose, which, what</i></p>

(Chart F, can be sung to the tune of Ode to Joy)</p> <p><i>all, another, any, anybody, anyone, anything, both, each, either, everybody, everyone, everything, few, many, more, most, neither, nobody, none, one, other, several, some, somebody, someone, such</i></p>	<p>Examples, Please 700</p> <p>What are the Relative Pronouns? (Chart D)</p> <p>Infinitive: "to" + verb Present: present form Past: verb + "-ed" Present Participle: verb + "-ing" Past Participle: verb + "-ed" or "-en" or "-t"</p>	<p>Numerous Numbers 300</p> <p>What are the 8 parts of speech? (Chart A)</p> <p>noun, pronoun, verb, adverb, conjunction, interjection, preposition, adjective</p>	<p>Numerous Numbers 500</p> <p>We get 12 verb tenses by combining 3 times and 4 forms. What are the times and forms?</p> <p>Time: present, past, future Forms: simple, perfect, progressive, perfect progressive</p>
<p>Numerous Numbers 700</p> <p>What are the 4 verb attributes? (Chart C)</p> <p>person (1st, 2nd, 3rd), number (singular & plural), voice (active & passive), mood (indicative, imperative, subjunctive)</p>	<p>Define Me 100</p> <p>This is a word that asserts an action, shows a state of being, links two words together, or helps another verb. (Chart C)</p> <p>Verb</p>	<p>Define Me 200</p> <p>-2 parts-</p> <p>1- This names a person, place, thing, activity, or idea. (Chart E)</p> <p>Noun</p> <p>2- This replaces a noun in order to avoid repetition. (Chart F)</p> <p>Pronoun</p>	<p>Define Me 300</p> <p>This modifies a noun or pronoun by describing, qualifying, or limiting. (Chart L)</p> <p>Adjective</p>

<p>Define Me 400</p> <p>This is a word used to connect words, phrases or clauses together. (Chart H)</p> <p><i>Conjunction</i></p>	<p>Define Me 500</p> <p>This is a word or phrase used as a strong expression of feeling or emotion. (Chart J)</p> <p><i>Interjection</i></p>	<p>Define Me 600</p> <p>This modifies a verb, adjective, or another adverb. (Chart I)</p> <p><i>Adverb</i></p>	<p>Define Me 700</p> <p>This relates a noun or pronoun to another word. (Chart J)</p> <p><i>Preposition</i></p>
